Manali Desai is Professor of Comparative and Historical Sociology at the Department of Sociology, University of Cambridge and a Fellow of Newnham College.

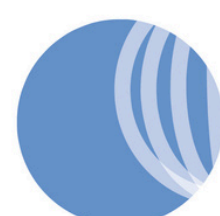
